FLEETWOOD BOROUGH NEWS

New Reverse 9-1-1 System: CodeRed

The borough has a new system to alert residents of emergencies and relevant info



via phone, text message, or E-mail. This new service is called CodeRed from OnSolve. See https://www.fleetwoodboro.com/reverse-9-1-1/ to sign up for this important service.

Reservoir Preservation

The Fleetwood Reservoir property is 190 acres of forest land located off of Willow Road in Ruscombmanor Township. From 1891 to 1994, springs on this land fed water into two ponds which served as Fleetwood's water source. In 1994 a one and a half million-gallon concrete tank was constructed to serve as Fleetwood's water source storage. Another 500,000-gallon steel tank was added in 2010. After these tanks were installed, springs were no longer used as the borough's water source as the water was pumped from underground. At this point, the 190-acre woodland was not needed as a water source. However, the Fleetwood Borough Council viewed this land as a valuable asset to the Borough and wished to preserve it. The Fleetwood Borough, with the help of Berks Nature, applied and received a \$275,0000 the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) for the development rights that will preserve the land. This means that development will never occur on this land and the 190 acres will remain a forest forever. The money received from DCNR will be used to maintain and improve this area in the future.

Due to the significant involvement of Council Vice President Pete Merkel in the entire watershed area, in 2024 the Fleetwood Borough Council passed an ordinance naming the trails on this land The Peter Merkel Walking Trails.

Cable Provider

Fleetwood Borough has entered into an agreement that may allow Comcast to service Fleetwood Borough residents. At this time, Comcast is supplying a few residents in Fleetwood Internet via a federal initiative to get Internet to underserved residents, but this could add the potential for a second provider in Fleetwood for the remaining residents.

Fleetwood Grants:

- The borough has received matching grants that continue to restore and improve the creek in Fleetwood Park. The next phase will go out for bid this summer and start construction in 2026.
- Fleetwood received a grant from DCNR for \$250,000 with a 50% match from the borough (\$500K total project) to build a new bathhouse and other improvements at the Fleetwood pool. Construction to start fall / winter 2025 and conclude before the pool reopens in May 2026.
- Fleetwood applied for a Department of Community & Economic Development (DCED) grant to build pickleball courts behind the public works garage near the pool. This is a highly competitive grant but with public support we hope to obtain this grant. Grant notifications are typically in early 2026.
- The borough applied for a Local Share Accounts (LSA) for the Fleetwood police to add traffic and community cameras as well as purchasing needed equipment like new radios and safety gear. Funding will be announced toward the end of 2025.

Storm Sewer Study

The borough has contracted with HRG engineering firm to assess and recommend improvements to the entire borough's stormwater system.

From our Fire Company

As summer comes to a close, the members of the FVFC are only getting started with the busiest time of the year. Many of our fundraisers happen now until the end of the year. Our homemade hoagie sale continues the 3rd Wednesday of Sept, Nov, Jan, March and May. Orders can be placed with any member as well as on our Facebook page. Our semi-annual \$20 ticket sale drawing happens the 1st Sunday in November from 12 to 4pm at the Fire Co. banquet hall on Franklin Street. If any tickets are available, they will be sold on our Facebook page.



Members will also be conducting several fire

prevention visits to schools, preschools, and churches during the month of October. We also host smaller groups for tours and educational talks at our station. Our annual open house will take place on Oct. 14th from 6pm to 8pm at the station.

As the members continue to respond to all types of hazards in our area, we also continue to train most Tuesday nights from 6 to 8pm. Members can join at 14 years of age and grow through the ranks. Our group is an all-hazards department where multiple disciplines are trained on constantly. From vehicle extrication and rope rescue to firefighting and medical emergencies. There is always something to train on, work on and be a part of at Fleetwood.

Stop down and see what we do. You may find your calling. Help your community with service to others.

Fire Prevention Week: Know the Risks of Lithium-Ion Batteries!

The Blandon Fire Company is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) - the official sponsor of the Fire Prevention Week $^{\text{\tiny M}}$ for more than 100 years - to promote this year's campaign. It highlights how important it is to buy, charge, and recycle lithium-ion batteries safely.

Most of the electronics we use in our home every day - smart phones, tablets, power and lawn tools, laptops, e-cigarettes, headphones and toys to name just a few - are powered by lithium-ion batteries. In fact, most everything that's rechargeable uses this type of battery.

If not used correctly or if damaged, these batteries can overheat, start a fire, or even explode. To reduce these risks, look around your home - it's important to know which devices are powered by them. "Lithium-ion batteries are powerful, convenient, and they're just about everywhere," said Blandon's Fire Chief Daniel L Miller. "This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign helps people understand the importance of using these batteries correctly to prevent fires in the home and to follow the **Buy, Charge, and Recycle Safely** approach"

• Buy only listed products: When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery, take time to research it. Look for a stamp from a nationally recognized testing lab on the packaging and product which means that it meets important safety standards. Not meeting safety standards increases the fire risk.

- Charge devices safely: Always use original cables & follow manufacturer's instructions. Buy only manufacturer (or manufacturer approved) replacement charging components. Charge your device on a hard surface (soft, flexible surfaces could cause a fire). Don't overcharge your device - unplug/remove battery when fully charged.
- Recycle batteries responsibly: Do not throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could catch fire. Recycle your device/battery at a safe battery recycling location. Visit call2recycle.org to find a site near you.

The Blandon Fire Company encourages all residents to be aware of their devices, follow the Buy, Charge, and Recycle Safely approach, and support this year's Fire Prevention Week theme by attending our Open House on October 7, 2025 at 6 pm at the Blandon Fire Company (36 W. Wesner Rd, Blandon, PA 19510).



Dear Water System Customers,

You may have heard the term PFAS in the news lately, and you

might be wondering what it means for your water. Here is what you should know, and what we are doing to keep your drinking water safe.

What Are PFAS?

PFAS (pronounced "pee-fass") stands for Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances. These are a group of man-made chemicals that have been used for decades in products like:

- Non-stick cookware (Teflon);
- Water-resistant clothing;
- · Food packaging; and
- · Firefighting foams.

Because of how they're made, PFAS don't break down easily in the environment or the human body. That's why they're often called "forever chemicals."

How Do PFAS Get into Water?

PFAS can enter drinking water through a variety of different avenues, including but not limited to industrial discharges, landfills, firefighting training sites, and wastewater systems. Although many PFAS are being phased out, they may be found in water sources across the country due to their persistence in the environment and difficulty to destroy.

Research suggests that exposure to PFOA and PFOS from today's consumer products is usually low, and most PFAS do not easily absorb into the skin. While higher exposures are probable for contaminated drinking water, showering, bathing, or washing dishes in water containing PFAS is typically low.

Are PFAS in Our Water?

Fleetwood Borough regularly tests our water to comply with all state and federal regulations. The PA Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) have set maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for several PFAS compounds.

Here's what has been adopted:

PA DEP (2023): PFOA: 14 parts per trillion (ppt): PFOS: 18 ppt **EPA (Finalized April 2024):** PFOA & PFOS: 4 ppt 4 more PFAS compounds

The new EPA rule will take effect nationally, and we are actively preparing by expanding our sampling program. All sampling results so far have shown PFAS levels below state and federal safety limits.

If PFAS are detected in our system above safety levels listed above:

- You'll be notified promptly
- We'll share the results and how they compare to safety limits
- We'll outline the actions we're taking to protect your health

What Are We Doing to Keep You Safe?

The Fleetwood Borough team is committed to:

- Monitoring: Testing water for PFAS according to EPA and PA DEP standards.
- Planning: Preparing for any needed upgrades or treatment changes.
- Communication: Providing updates and education to customers.

What Can You Do?

While eliminating PFAS exposure entirely isn't practical, you can reduce your risk:

- Use a certified water filter for PFAS removal (NSF/ANSI 53 or 58)
- Avoid non-stick cookware—opt for stainless steel or cast iron
- Skip stain-resistant or water-repellent fabrics and sprays
- Check personal care labels for "PTFE" or "fluoro" ingredients
- Avoid food packaging with oil- or water-resistant coatings

If you have a private well, you're responsible for its maintenance and testing. Fleetwood Borough can help answer questions about PFAS sampling and filters.

A Fall/Winter Message from the Police

As we welcome Fall/Winter, we also face seasonal safety challenges — from slippery roadways and increased deliveries to a rise in scams. This issue focuses on helping you protect your family, property, and peace of mind. Thank you for working with us to keep our community safe.

School Zone Safety: Icy roads, darker mornings, and distracted driving increase risks near schools. Officers are conducting enhanced patrols around schools this winter. Please help us keep children safe.

- Drive Slowly: Obey school zone speed limits at all times.
- Watch for Ice: Increase stopping distance and approach crosswalks cautiously.
- Never Pass a School Bus: Red flashing lights mean children are loading or unloading.
- **Use Headlights:** Make yourself more visible on dark mornings.
- Park Smart: Don't block crosswalks or fire lanes during drop-off and pickup.

Package Theft Prevention: Online shopping rises during winter and so do "porch pirate" thefts. Here's how to protect your deliveries:

- Use Delivery Alerts: Sign up for tracking updates.
- Pick Up Quickly: Retrieve packages as soon as possible.
- Secure Drop-Off Options: Use lockboxes, delivery lockers, or ask a trusted neighbor.
- Install Cameras: A visible doorbell or security camera can deter theft.

 Report Suspicious Activity: If you see something, say something — call our non-emergency line.

Holiday Tip: Don't advertise gifts by leaving boxes at the curb. Break them down and conceal them in your recycling.

Scam Prevention Alert: Scammers get creative during winter — especially during the holidays and tax season. Common scams include:

- **Fake Utility Calls:** Threatening to shut off service unless you pay immediately.
- Package Delivery Scams: Phony texts or emails asking you to click links.
- Charity Fraud: Impersonating nonprofits to solicit donations.
- Government Impersonators: Claiming to be from the IRS or Social Security.

Remember: Never give personal info or payment over the phone or email to unsolicited callers; Always verify websites and caller IDs.; When in doubt, hang up and call the company or agency directly.
